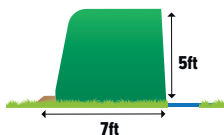
CANAL TURN 8 24

A sizeable fence (5ft high, 7ft wide) that is immediately followed by a 90-degree left-hand turn - jump it at an angle and you can save both distance and the horse's energy



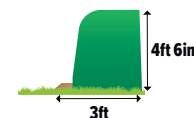
VALENTINE'S BROOK 9 25

Another fence that deserves enormous respect, as tall and wide as the Canal Turn, plus it has a brook on the landing side



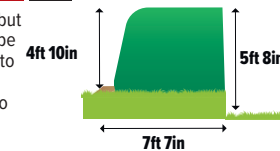
FOINAVON 7 23

One of the racecourse's smallest fences is known as Foinavon after the 1967 winner, who emerged from an almighty pile-up to win at 100-1



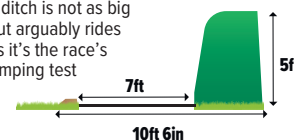
BECHER'S BROOK 6 22

The sport's most famous fence but one that no longer deserves to be called infamous following work to level off the landing side's once formidable drop. Jockeys look to angle out here because of the corner that follows



OPEN DITCH 3 19

The first open ditch is not as big as the Chair but arguably rides even bigger as it's the race's first serious jumping test

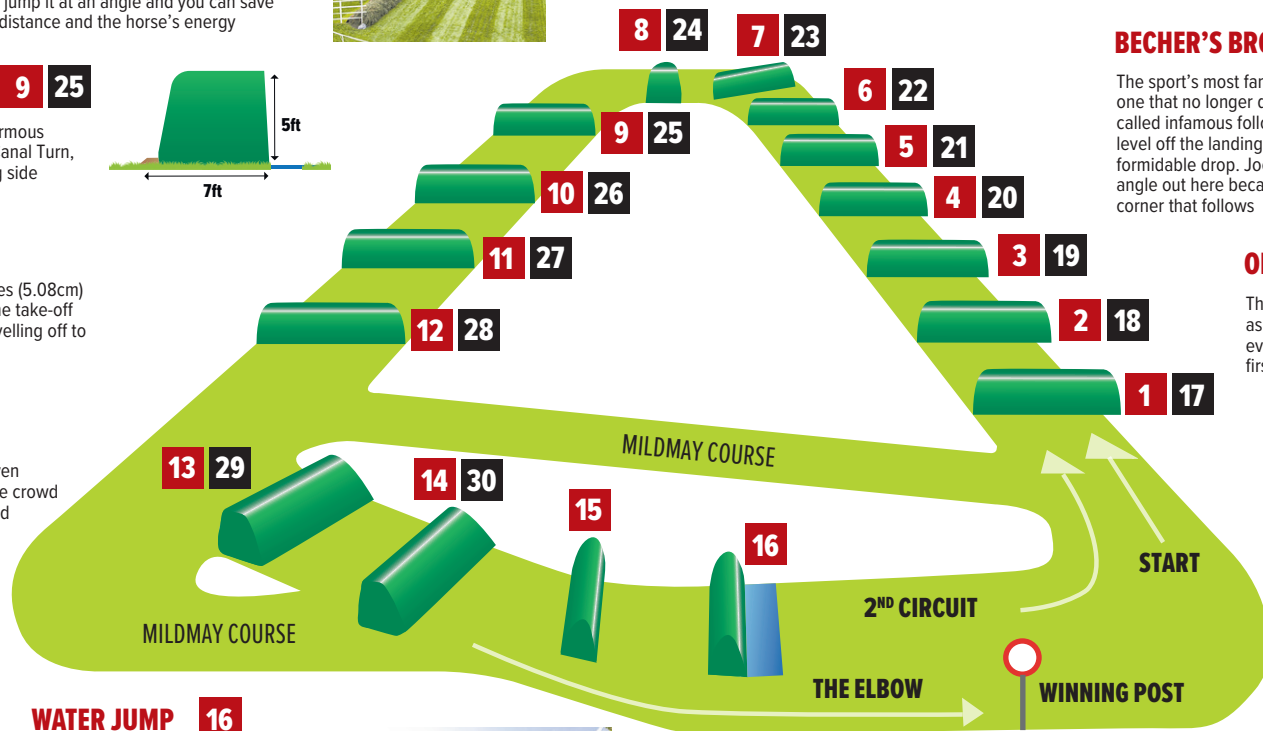
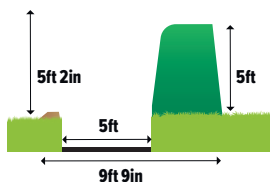


OPEN DITCH 11 27

Has been reduced in height by two inches (5.08cm) to 4ft 10in (147cm) from 5ft (152cm) on the take-off side; the landing side has undergone levelling off to reduce the drop

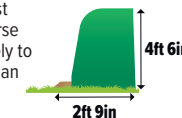
THE CHAIR 15

The course's biggest fence but made even more daunting by its narrowness and the crowd noise that greets the Grand National field



FIRST FENCE 1 17

One of the smallest fences on the course and much less likely to cause problems than in the old days



WATER JUMP 16

The smallest fence on the track is followed by an expanse of water and replaced a massive stone wall in 1841



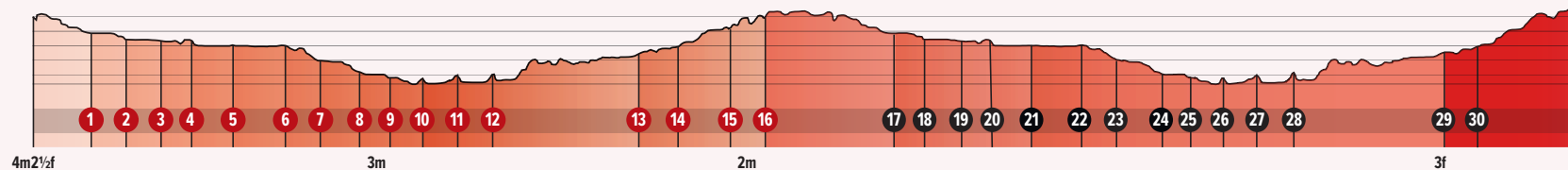
THE ELBOW

The run from the final fence to the winning post is unusually long and broken up by the right-then-left chicane that comes after more than four miles of galloping

START

The Grand National will be initiated by a standing start, rather than the horses walking into the tape. The first fence has been moved 60 yards closer to the starting point of the Grand National. This is in an attempt to reduce the speed at which horses approach the first of the 30 fences
